College hosts 20th carnival for kids

About 700 people attended a free carnival at Northwestern Health Sciences University on February 23. The event was part of the annual Bloomington Loves Its Kids celebration held every February. This was the 20th year the University hosted the carnival.

"The carnival went really well," said Sarah Erickson, Northwestern's community relations intern. "The kids looked like they were really having fun,

and attendance was up 400 people from last year."

There were many activities and performances, including face painting, a puppet show and jugglers. A Game Cube was one of several prizes awarded to the children through a raffle. In addition to the free entertainment and activities there were dozens of vendors from the community. The carnival, organized by the city and the Bloomington Parks and Recreation division, was co-sponsored by Northwestern Health Sciences University, The Optimists Club, and the Bloomington Public Schools.

Capital campaign makes good progress

NHSU has raised almost half of its \$8 million Capital Campaign goal, according to Brady Forseth, director of development for the college.

In addition, the campaign, "Imagine Our Future" has raised more than \$5 million of the \$15 million planned giving goal, which will be used to establish a permanent endowment.

The cash gifts are going toward funding a 48,000 square foot addition to the south side of the campus, the Wolfe-Harris Center for Excellence. The plan is also to extensively renovate the current building with funds from the Capital Campaign. The result will be nearly 300,000 square feet of state-of-the-art educational facilities.

A recent phonathon, according to Forseth, also raised \$27,000 in gifts and pledges.
