In the U.S. the program is administered by Palmer College of Chiropractic. There are currently 147 graduates and another 75 will complete the program in 2008. Membership in the ICA Council on Chiropractic Pediatrics is not required at enrollment, but DCs must become members of the Council before sitting for Year I exam.

FAQs

Q. What does Year I include?

A. Year I is designed to give you a solid foundation about pregnant women, infants and children. The syllabus is structured, starting with pregnancy and going on to birth, postpartum, infant, toddler, school-age and adolescence. Adjustment techniques are included in each module. By focusing on each stage of a child's development you get the foundation to move on to the next phase which includes more in-depth courses on neurology, orthopedics, radiology, nutrition, special needs, sports injuries, etc., as well as specific adjustment techniques.

Q. How long is the DICCP program?

A. The full course has 30 modules. These are all classroom modules and take about 3 years to complete.

Q. Do I have to do any exams and who holds these exams?

A. Yes, you will do an exam at the end of Year I and another exam at the end of Year III that will determine your Board eligibility. Both these exams include written and oral and are administered by Palmer College.

Q. When do I sit for the DICCP exam and who conducts it?

A. You sit for the DICCP exam after you've been declared "Board Eligible" by Palmer College (in the U.S.). The Board exam is conducted by the Testing Board of the ICA Council on Chiropractic Pediatrics.

Q. What is the difference between the DICCP and other pediatric programs?

A. The DICCP program is the only all-classroom program of 360 hours. You don't get credits for attending other seminars or home study because of the structured syllabus. Two research papers are mandatory as well as one oral presentation and two examinations before you can become "Board Eligible."

Q. What happens after I pass the DICCP exam?

A. You will be awarded your DICCP diploma at a graduation ceremony held by the Council on Chiropractic Pediatrics at its Annual Conference.

In 2008 three classes will graduate and successful candidates will receive their DICCP credential on December 13 at the Annual Conference in the Bahamas.

Start your DICCP now and plan to graduate by 2011.
